Chapter 1. Preparing your computer

Before you begin

Be sure to read "Safety notices" on page v and "Notices" on page 40.

Selecting a location for your computer

Make sure you have an adequate number of properly grounded electrical outlets for all devices. Select a location for the computer where it will remain dry. Leave about 50 mm (2 in.) of space around the computer for proper air circulation.

Arranging your workspace

Arrange both the equipment and your work area to suit you. Light sources, air circulation, and the location of electrical outlets can affect how you arrange your workspace.


Comfort

The following guidelines will help you decide what working position suits you best.

Choose a chair to reduce fatigue from sitting in the same position for long periods. The backrest and seat should adjust independently and provide good support. The seat should have a curved front to relieve pressure on the thighs. Adjust the seat so that your thighs are parallel to the floor and your feet are either flat on the floor, or on a footrest.

When using the keyboard, keep your forearms parallel to the floor and your wrists in a neutral, comfortable position. Try to keep a light touch on the keyboard, and your hands and fingers relaxed. Change the angle of the

keyboard for maximum comfort by adjusting the position of the keyboard feet.



Adjust the monitor so that the top of the screen is at, or slightly below, eye level. Place the monitor at a comfortable viewing distance, usually 51 to 61 cm (20 to 24 in.), and position it so that you can view it without having to twist your body.

Glare and lighting

Position the monitor to minimize glare and reflections from overhead lights, windows, and other light sources. Place the monitor at right angles to light sources whenever possible. Reduce overhead lighting, if necessary, by turning off lights or using lower wattage bulbs. If you install the monitor near a window, use curtains or blinds to block the sunlight. You might have to adjust the Brightness and Contrast controls on the monitor as the lighting changes throughout the day.

Where it is impossible to avoid reflections or to adjust the lighting, place an antiglare filter over the screen. However, these filters might affect the clarity of the screen image; try them only after you have exhausted other methods of reducing glare.

Dust compounds problems associated with glare. Clean your monitor screen periodically using a soft cloth moistened with a nonabrasive, liquid glass cleaner.

Air circulation

Your computer and monitor produce heat. The computer fan pulls in fresh air and forces out hot air. The monitor lets hot air escape through vents. Blocking the air vents can cause overheating, possibly resulting in malfunction or damage. Place the computer and monitor so that nothing blocks the air vents; usually 50 mm (2 in.) of air space is sufficient. Also, make sure the vented air is not blowing on someone else.

Electrical outlets and cable lengths

The location of electrical outlets and the length of device power cords and cables might determine the final placement of your computer.

When arranging your workspace:

- Avoid the use of extension cords. Whenever possible, plug the computer power cord directly into an electrical outlet.
- Keep power cords and cables neatly routed away from walkways and other areas where they might be accidentally dislodged.



Chapter 2. Setting up your computer


Use the following information when setting up your computer. Look for the small connector icons on the back of your computer.

If your computer cables and connector panel have color-coded connectors, match the color of the cable end with the color of the connector. For example, match a blue cable end with a blue connector, a red cable end with a red connector.


1. Check the position of the voltage-selection switch on the rear of the computer. Use a ballpoint pen to slide the switch, if necessary.



- If the voltage supply range is 90–137 V ac, set the switch to 115 V.
- If the voltage supply range is 180–265 V ac, set the switch to 230 V.
- Your computer might come with a standard keyboard cable 1 or a USB keyboard cable 2. Connect the keyboard cable to the appropriate keyboard connector.




Your computer might come with a standard mouse cable 1 or a USB mouse cable 2. Connect the mouse cable to the appropriate mouse connector.



4. Attach the monitor cable to the monitor connector and tighten the screws.




5. If you have a modem, connect the modem.



- **1** Some modems are attached directly to a telephone line wall connector.
- 2 Modem connections vary by geography. In some countries, such as the United States, connect the modem cables as shown in the illustration.
- **3** In some other countries, a splitter or converter is required, as shown in the illustration.
- 6. If you have speakers, use this connector to send amplified audio signals from the computer to the speakers.




- Connect any additional devices you have. Not all computers will have the connectors shown.
 - a. Audio



Audio line-in connector Use this connector to receive audio signals from an external audio device, such as a stereo system.
 Audio line-out connector Use this connector to send audio signals from the computer to external devices, such as powered stereo speakers.
 Microphone Use this connector to attach a microphone to your computer when you want to record voice or if you use speech-recognition software.
 Headphone Use this connector to attach headphones to your computer when you want to listen to music or other sounds without disturbing anyone.

b. Additional connectors




1 USB connector	Use these connectors to attach a device that requires a Universal Serial Bus (USB) connection, such as a USB scanner or USB printer.
2 Serial connector	Use this connector to attach an external modem, serial printer, or other device that uses a 9-pin serial connector.
3 S-video connector	This connector is present on some high-performance video adapters. Use this connector to attach a television set that has an S-Video connector.
4 Parallel connector	Use this connector to attach a parallel printer or any other device that requires a 25-pin parallel connection.
5 Ethernet connector	Use this connector to attach to an Ethernet-type local area network or to a cable modem.
6 MIDI/Joystick connector	Use this connector to attach a joystick, gamepad, or a Musical Instrument Digital Interface (MIDI) device such as a MIDI keyboard.
7 IEEE 1394 connector	The technology used for this connector is sometimes called Firewire, so called because it transmits data rapidly. There are two types of IEEE 1394 connectors: the 4-pin and the 6-pin. IEEE 1394 offers connection to all types of consumer electronics, including digital audio devices, scanners, and other devices.
8 S/PDIF connector	S/PDIF connector enables you to connect consumer digital equipment such as digital audio tape (DAT) devices, CD drives, and other S/PDIF-compatible devices.

- Important

To operate the computer within FCC limits, use a category 5 Ethernet cable.

Turning on power

Turn on the monitor and other external devices first; then turn on the computer. When the self-test is done, the IBM logo window closes. If your computer has preinstalled software, the software installation program begins.

Important

Please read the license agreements carefully before using the programs included with this system. These agreements detail your rights, obligations, and warranties for the software included with this system. By using the programs, you accept the terms of these agreements. If you do not accept the agreements included with this system, do not use the programs. Instead, promptly return the system for a full refund.

If you experience any problems during startup, refer to "Chapter 3. Troubleshooting and software recovery" on page 13 and "Chapter 4. Getting information, help and service" on page 21.

Finishing the software installation

After you start the computer for the first time, follow the instructions on the screen to complete the software installation. If you do not complete the software installation the first time the computer is turned on, unexpected results might occur. Once the installation is complete, click the Access IBM icon on your desktop for more information about your computer.

Software Selections CD

The *Software Selections CD* contains application programs and support software for use with your computer. Insert the *Software Selections CD* into your CD drive and follow the instructions on the screen.

You can use the CD to:

- Install software products or documentation directly from the CD on models equipped with a CD drive.
- Create an image of the *Software Selections CD* on your hard disk or on a local area network (LAN) disk and install the software products from that image.

The *Software Selections CD* has an easy-to-use, graphical interface and automated installation procedure for most programs. It also has a help system that describes the features of the CD.

For more information about installing software from the *Software Selections CD*, go to Access IBM on your desktop.

Other operating systems

If you install your own operating system, follow the instructions that come with your operating system CDs or diskettes. Remember to install all device drivers after you install your operating system. Installation instructions are provided with or on the CDs or diskettes, or in the README files.

Shutting down the computer

When you are ready to turn off your computer, always follow the shut down procedure. This prevents the loss of unsaved data or damage to your software programs. To shut down Windows:

- 1. Click Start on the Windows desktop.
- 2. Click Shut Down.
- 3. Select Shut down.
- 4. Click OK.

Accessing and printing the User Guide

The *User Guide* for your computer has information about installing optional hardware. This Portable Document Format (.PDF) file can be accessed through Access IBM on your desktop. It can be viewed using Adobe Acrobat Reader and printed for use when installing optional hardware.

Recording your computer information

Recording information about your computer can be helpful if you ever need your computer serviced.

The machine type (M/T), model number and serial number (S/N) are labeled on your computer. Use the following table to record this information:

Chapter 3. Troubleshooting and software recovery

If you are having a problem with your computer, this chapter describes some basic troubleshooting and software recovery tools. Go to Access IBM on your desktop for more advanced troubleshooting.

Error codes

The following table includes some of the error codes that might display when you turn on the computer.

- Record any error codes that are displayed. If you call for service, you will be asked for the error codes.
- If you get multiple error codes, always work in the order in which the error codes are displayed.
- If the error code is not in the following table, more in-depth troubleshooting is required.

- If the operating system starts when you turn on your computer, use Access IBM to run the IBM Enhanced Diagnostics and see the online troubleshooting procedures.

Code	Description	Action
161 or 0250	The battery is defective.	Replace the battery. See the battery replacement procedure in your online <i>User Guide</i> available through Access IBM.
162 or 0251	A change in device configuration occurred.	 Verify that: All external devices are turned on. All devices are properly installed and securely connected. If you cannot correct the problem, have the computer serviced.
301, 303, 0211 or 0212	A keyboard error has occurred.	 Verify that: The keyboard is properly connected. No keys on the keyboard are stuck. If you cannot correct the problem, have the computer serviced.
0280	Previous boot incomplete - Default configuration used	Previous POST did not complete successfully. POST loads default values and offers to run Setup. This error is cleared the next time the computer is turned on.

- If the operating system will not start, have the computer serviced.

Software recovery

Use this section if you have to recover your operating system.

Attention:

For most computers, the Product Recovery program is on a separate, hidden, hard disk drive partition. Do not delete or alter this parition. If this partition becomes damages or altered, see "Chapter 4. Getting information, help and service" on page 21.

Creating and using a Recovery Repair diskette

The Product Recovery program is on a separate partition from the operating system and runs independently of the operating system. To gain access to the Product Recovery program, you must press F11 during startup while the Press F11 prompt is visible.

If the file that controls the F11 prompt becomes damaged or is accidentally erased, the F11 prompt will not appear and you will not have access to the Product Recovery program. The only method of recovering from this problem is through the use of the *Recovery Repair* diskette. It is a good idea to create a *Recovery Repair* diskette as soon as possible and store it in a safe place as a precautionary measure.

To create a Recovery Repair diskette:

- 1. Start your computer and operating system.
- 2. Use Windows Explorer to display the directory structure of your hard disk.
- 3. Open the C:\IBMTOOLS folder.
- 4. Double-click RRDISK.BAT and follow the instructions on the screen.

To use the Recovery Repair diskette:

- 1. Shut down the operating system and turn off the computer.
- 2. Insert the Recovery Repair diskette into the diskette drive.
- 3. Turn on the computer and follow the instructions on the screen.

Performing a partial or full recovery

Attention:

The Product Recovery Program on the hidden hard disk drive partition will overwrite all files on the C:\ drive only. A *full recovery* will restore the operating system, device drivers, and applications. A *partial recovery* will restore your operating system and device drivers without restoring applications.

- Important

If you are recovering your operating system from a *Product Recovery CD* and you have more than one CD, always start with *Product Recovery CD* 1.

To perform a recovery of the operating system, do the following:

- 1. If you are recovering your software using a *Product Recovery CD*, insert the CD into the CD drive and continue at the next step. If you are using the Product Recovery program on the hard disk, continue at the next step.
- 2. If possible, shut down your operating system normally.
- 3. If your computer is still on, turn it off.

Note: If the computer will not turn off after you hold down the power button for at least four seconds, unplug the power cord and wait a few seconds before reconnecting it.

4. Turn on your computer. If you are using the Product Recovery Program (not the *Product Recovery CD*), quickly press F11 when the Product Recovery Program prompt displays (this displays for only a few seconds). Wait for the product recovery menu to display.

Note: If you are attempting to recover from a *Product Recovery CD* and your computer will not boot from the CD, go to "Changing the boot sequence" and select **CDROM** as the 1st Boot Device.

- 5. You might have a choice of operating systems to recover. Select the operating system you are recovering.
- 6. Select your recovery option and follow the instructions on the screen.
- 7. When recovery is complete, exit from the program and remove the CD (if present) from the CD drive.
- 8. Restart the computer.

Note: If you recover Windows NT[®] Workstation, the hard disk must be partitioned before all hard disk drive space is available. For information on partitioning the remainder of your hard disk, see **Changing the operating system** in Access IBM.

Changing the boot sequence

If you inserted a CD in the CD drive and your computer does not read the CD on startup, change the 1st Boot Device. These procedures vary depending on your machine type.

Changing the 1st Boot device on machine types 2255 and 2275

- 1. If your computer is already on when you start this procedure, shut down the operating system and restart the system.
- 2. When the program prompt appears, press and hold F1 until the Configuration Setup Utility menu appears.
- 3. Select Start Options. Press Enter on Start Sequence.
- 4. Select 1st Boot Device.
- 5. Select CDROM. Then follow the prompts on the screen.
- 6. When you finish making changes, select Exit Saving Changes.
- 7. Your computer will restart.
- **Note:** Be sure to change the 1st Boot Device back to the original setting when you are finished using the CD.

Changing the 1st Boot device on machine types 6832 and 6833

- 1. If your computer is already on when you start this procedure, shut down the operating system and restart the system.
- 2. Once the IBM logo appears, press and hold F12 until you see the BIOS Boot menu.
- 3. Select **CD-ROM Drive** and press the Enter key. The computer startup continues using the CD drive as the boot device.

IBM Enhanced Diagnostics

The IBM Enhanced Diagnostics program runs independently of the operating system. You can use this program to test hardware components of your computer. This program is used when other methods are not available or have not been successful in isolating a problem suspected to be hardware related.

Running IBM Enhanced Diagnostics from the Product Recovery program

- **Note:** If for some reason the Product Recovery program on your computer hard disk is damaged or not accessible, the IBM Enhanced Diagnostics can be run from the *Product Recovery CD*.
- 1. Shut down your operating system and turn off the computer.
- 2. Turn on your computer. Quickly press F11 when the Product Recovery Program prompt displays (the prompt displays for only a few seconds). Wait for the product recovery menu to display.
- 3. Depending on your operating system, you might be prompted to select a system setting. If no prompt displays, go to the next step.
- 4. When the main menu appears, select System Utilities.
- 5. From the System Utilities menu, select **Run Diagnostics**. The IBM Enhanced Diagnostics Program starts. When you are finished running diagnostics, you will be returned to the Product Recovery program main menu.
- 6. Restart the computer.

- 1. Shut down your operating system and turn off the computer.

- 3. Depending on your operating system, you might be prompted to select a system setting. If no prompt displays, go to the next step.
- 4. From the main menu, select System Utilities.
- 5. Select **Create a diagnostic diskette** and follow the instructions on the screen.
- 6. When prompted, insert a blank, formatted diskette into the diskette drive and follow the directions on the screen.

Running the IBM Enhanced Diagnostics from a diskette
